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1.0 Introduction

This Community Consultation Plan (CCP) has been prepared to support the Progressive Rehabilitation and Closure Plan (PRC Plan) for the Daunia Mine (DNM), operated by Whitehaven Coal (WHC). The CCP outlines the framework for engaging stakeholders with a genuine interest in rehabilitation and closure planning, in accordance with the requirements of section 126C of the *Environmental Protection Act 1994* (EP Act).

The CCP includes:

- Consultation requirements as part of PRC planning;
- The objectives and desired outcomes for community consultation in PRC planning for DNM;
- The consultation process and program, including proposed frequency of consultation;
- Information to be released for community consultation; and
- How community feedback will be considered in PRC plan updates.

This CCP has been compiled by Environmental Resources Management Australia Pty Ltd (ERM), with consultation support from DNM team members. Its implementation will be led by the DNM Community Relations team, with strategic input from the DNM Closure Planning team.

The CCP is designed to ensure that consultation is inclusive, transparent, and responsive to stakeholder concerns. It reflects WHC's commitment to progressive rehabilitation and responsible mine closure, and aims to align post-mining land use outcomes with community aspirations and regional development goals.

2.0 PRCP Community Consultation Context

2.1 Daunia Mine Context

DNM is an open cut metallurgical coal mine located approximately 30 km southeast of Moranbah and 170 km southwest of Mackay in Queensland, within the Isaac Regional Council (IRC) Local Government Area (LGA). The mine commenced operations in 2013 and was acquired by Whitehaven Coal (WHC) in April 2024. The resource authorities are held by Whitehaven Daunia Pty Ltd, a wholly owned subsidiary of WHC.

Mining activities occur across three mining leases (MLs), 70115, 1781 and 70116 operating under Environmental Authority (EA) EPML00561913.

The site uses a combination of one large electric shovel and two large hydraulic excavators for waste removal, with smaller excavators for coal mining. Coal and waste are loaded into fleets of autonomous haul trucks.

DNM operates a Coal Handling and Preparation Plant (CHPP) with a run-of-mine capacity of approximately 6.2-6.4 million tonnes per annum (Mtpa), producing both hard coking coal and pulverised coal injection (PCI) coal for export. Coal is exported primarily through the Dalrymple Bay Coal Terminals.

The mine is located on the traditional lands of the Barada Barna People, who have a registered Native Title Claim. The mine's operations are supported by comprehensive infrastructure, including autonomous vehicle technology and associated communication networks. The workforce at the mine is approximately 720 personnel .

Currently approved areas are planned for mining until around 2042. Land is progressively rehabilitated for post-mining outcomes including grazing and woodland habitat. Most of the land within the EA area is owned by Whitehaven Daunia Pty Ltd, with other ownership including private landholders and utilities relevant to access and infrastructure.

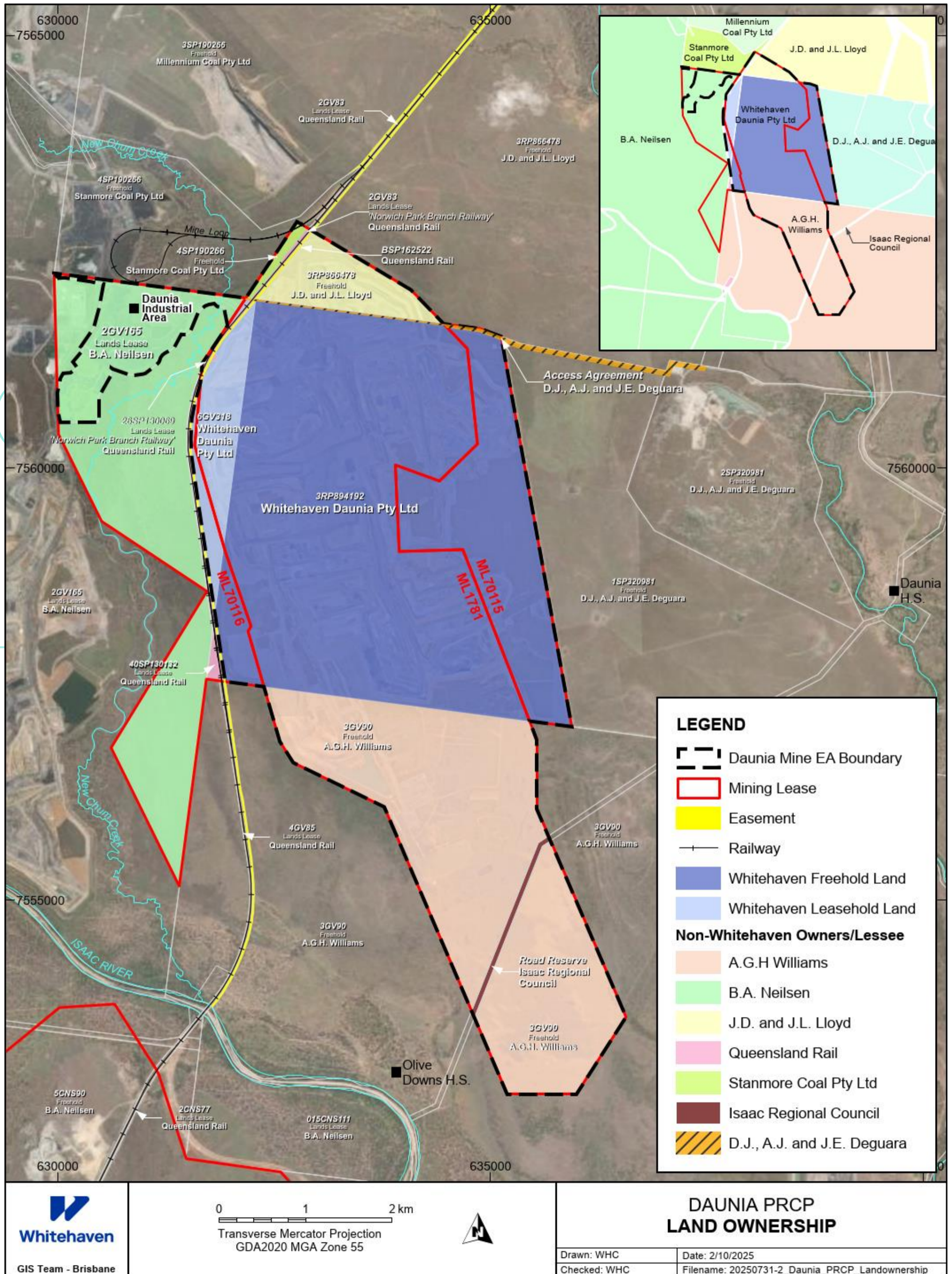


Figure 1 Land Ownership

A land ownership map is provided in Figure 1.

3.0 Regulatory Requirements

3.1 PRC Plan

The DNM PRC Plan, and this associated CCP, have been prepared under the transitional provisions of the *Mineral and Energy Resources (Financial Provisioning) Act 2018* (MERFP Act).

Under the MERFP Act, a PRC plan must be submitted:

- As part of an application for an Environmental Authority (EA) for a new mining activity associated with a mining lease; and
- When submitting an application for a major EA amendment.

Transitional arrangements under the MERFP Act apply to existing operations, including DNM. These arrangements specify a deadline by which a PRC plan must be submitted to the Department of Environment, Tourism, Science and Innovation (DETSI) for approval. The DNM PRC Plan was submitted on 29 June 2023 by former owners BM Alliance Coal Operations Pty Ltd (BMA). On 16 April 2025, DETSI issued an *Information Request Notice* to WHC, outlining matters to be addressed and specifying the actions required to finalise the PRCP application. On 24 November 2025, WHC submitted a Change Application under Section 132 of the EP Act to reflect changes to the mine and rehabilitation design approach compared to that proposed by BMA.

A PRC plan is required to consist of two parts:

- A rehabilitation planning part which includes information about the site and its operations, community engagement activities, proposed Post-Mining Land Uses (PMLUs) and Non-Use Management Areas (NUMAs), methodologies and techniques to rehabilitate the land, and it provides timeframes and reasoning for when land becomes available for rehabilitation; and
- A PRC Schedule which includes maps showing final rehabilitation and closure outcomes for the site, and it sets out time-based milestones for achieving PMLUs and/or NUMA outcomes.

The intent of a PRC plan is to specify:

- Site rehabilitation commitments, including the amount, type, location, and timing of rehabilitation activities; and
- Mining activities, including duration, PMLUs, and how rehabilitation will be carried out.

4.0 Legislative Requirements for Consultation

The EP Act requires site-specific applications for an EA for a mining activity relating to a mining lease to submit a PRC plan. Existing EA holders will be required to submit a PRC plan upon receiving a transition notice from the administering authority within a three-year transition period.

Community consultation must be undertaken when developing and implementing a PRC plan.

The PRC plan must include:

- Details of the consultation undertaken by the applicant in developing the proposed PRC plan
- Details of how the applicant will undertake ongoing consultation in relation to the rehabilitation to be carried out under the plan
- Extent to which each proposed PMLU or NUMA is consistent with the outcome of consultation with the community in developing the plan.

The community consultation process for the development of the PRC plan differs from the public notification process for the EA application or environmental impact statement (EIS).

In accordance with section 126C(1)(c)(iii) and (iv) of the EP Act, the rehabilitation planning part of the PRC plan must include:

- details of the consultation undertaken by the applicant in developing the proposed PRC plan, and
- details of how the applicant will undertake ongoing consultation in relation to the rehabilitation to be carried out under the plan.

To comply with section 126C(1)(d) of the EP Act, the rehabilitation planning part of the PRC plan must state the extent to which each post-mining land use for land identified in the PRCP schedule for the plan is consistent with:

- the outcome of consultation with the community in developing the plan, and
- any strategies or plans for the land of a local government, the State or the Commonwealth.

To comply with section 126C(1)(e), (f), (g) and (h) of the EP Act, the PRC plan must:

- for each proposed post-mining land use for land, state the applicant's proposed methods or techniques for rehabilitating the land to a stable condition in a way that supports the rehabilitation milestones under the proposed PRCP schedule
- identify the risks of a stable condition for land mentioned above not being achieved, and how the applicant intends to manage or minimise the risks
- for each proposed NUMA, state the reasons the applicant considers the area can not be rehabilitated to a stable condition
- for each matter mentioned above include copies of reports or other evidence relied on by the applicant for each proposed non-use management area.

4.1 Genuine Interest

The Queensland Government's Information Sheet on Community consultation for Progressive Rehabilitation and Closure Plan (ESR/2019/5101) (updated 24 June 2025) further clarifies that it is the responsibility of the applicant to identify, notify and engage the community regarding the rehabilitation and closure of the site and provide them the opportunity to comment.

When selecting members of the community to engage with, applicants must consider who in the broader community is directly influenced by the rehabilitation process or final land outcomes.

To be included in this consultation stage, members of the community must have a genuine interest in:

- the land where the activity will occur
- the land adjacent to where the activity will occur
- the land/amenities surrounding where the activity will occur that are likely to be impacted by the activity (e.g. groundwater/drinking water users within the surrounding area or community located upstream or downstream of the activity).

A genuine interest in the land must be demonstrable and legitimate. It may include, but is not limited to:

- direct impact interest (e.g. underlying and adjacent land holders)
- cultural interest (e.g. Indigenous communities, Traditional Owners including Native Title holders)
- heritage interest (e.g. state or local government or relevant community groups where heritage value is identified on the land the activity is to occur)
- environmental interest (e.g. state or local government or relevant community groups where environmental value is identified on the land the activity is to occur)
- recreational interest (e.g. relevant community groups who use the immediate, adjacent, upstream or downstream land for recreational purposes)

- land use interest (e.g. overlapping tenure holders, agricultural entities or local government where a planning scheme for the land is in place)
- health interest (e.g. state or local government or relevant community groups who have health concerns relating to the rehabilitation processes and final land outcomes for the project).

The administering authority must be satisfied that the applicant has attempted to consult with all community members with a genuine interest in the rehabilitation and closure of the project. If the administering authority is not satisfied, it has the ability to request further information from the applicant.

Community Consultation Plan

To comply with section 126C(1)(c)(iv) of the EP Act, the rehabilitation planning part must include a CCP detailing how ongoing consultation will be carried out in relation to the rehabilitation to be carried out under the PRC plan.

The CCP must include details of:

- Consultation requirements as part of PRC planning
- The objectives and desired outcomes for community consultation in PRC planning
- The consultation process and program, including proposed frequency of consultation
- Information to be released for community consultation
- How community feedback will be considered in PRC Plan updates.

In developing the proposed PRC plan, the community should at least be engaged on the plan for the mine, PMLUs or NUMAs, areas of disturbance, rehabilitation and management methods, progressive rehabilitation and closure timeframes.

Ongoing community consultation should continue throughout the stages of the mine life so that progressive rehabilitation and the socio-economic and environmental impacts related to mine closure can be discussed with the community.

Community consultation carried out through different processes (such as an EIS) may be used to address the requirements in section 126C(1)(c) of the EP Act. The details of this consultation must be provided in the rehabilitation planning part of the proposed PRC plan.

Transitional PRC plans are still required to meet the legislative requirements in section 126C(1)(c) of the EP Act. All proposed PRC plans must contain a CCP regardless of whether the site has an existing EA.

Community Consultation Register

To comply with section 126C(1)(c)(iii) of the EP Act, the rehabilitation planning part must include a community consultation register identifying the consultation carried out in developing the PRC plan. The community consultation register must include:

- Consultation date(s)
- Identification of each community member
- Description of consultation type (workshop, quarterly meetings, etc.)
- Information provided to the community
- Issues raised/discussed by the community
- How issues have been considered
- Decisions/outcomes of engagement
- Commitments made by the applicant.

Consultation should occur prior to any PRCP schedule amendments that are likely to impact the community and the community consultation register should be updated when this consultation is undertaken. The community consultation register serves as a formal record of how stakeholder input has influenced rehabilitation planning and closure outcomes.

The community consultation register for transitional PRC plans should include all recorded previous engagements with the community. Where there are land outcomes identified in a land outcome document, the applicant must include the details of any previous community consultation undertaken. If previous consultation has not been recorded or is unknown, the applicant must record this in the proposed PRC plan. Where there are no land outcomes identified in a land outcome document or previous consultation cannot be demonstrated, the applicant is required to comply with the requirements above as if it was a new application. It is recommended that applicants discuss the level of consultation expected in a pre-lodgement meeting prior to developing the PRC plan.

5.0 Consultation on DNM's Transitional PRC Plan

5.1 Objectives for Community Consultation

The objectives for community consultation for WHC's DNM Transitional PRC Plan include:

1. To engage stakeholders with a genuine interest in developing objectives and aspirations for post-mining land use and landform, and social value opportunities to be considered in PRC planning.
2. To support transparent access to information about DNM's PRC planning and implementation, enabling opportunities for the Moranbah community, DNM suppliers and government agencies and representatives to provide inputs and feedback on rehabilitation and closure outcomes.
3. To engage with utility owners and operators, and adjacent mining and energy tenement holders, to provide information about DNM's closure planning that supports them to manage their assets and interests.

5.2 Stakeholder Identification and Analysis

This section summarises stakeholders considered to have a genuine interest in DNM's PRC Plan, including:

- **Traditional Owners:** Barada Barna Peoples, represented by Barada Barna Aboriginal Corporation (BBAC).
- **Underlying and Adjacent Landholders (within 5 km):** Underlying includes Olive Downs, Mavis Downs, Winchester Downs/Poitrel. Adjacent includes Moorvale/Daunia. Nearby is Wotonga which is 10 km from closest ML.
- **Daunia Mine:** General Manager and Mine Personnel.
- **Local Government:** Isaac Regional Council (IRC).
- **Moranbah Community:** Moranbah residents.
- **Moranbah Community Groups and Businesses:** Community Groups and Businesses in Moranbah / the Issac Region.
- **Utilities:** Corporations and Government agencies including Aurizon (rail), Queensland Rail (rail). IRC (road reserve) and Ergon Energy (power supply).
- **Adjacent and Nearby Mining Interests:** Including Poitrel Mine (Stanmore), Red Mountain Infrastructure (Stanmore), Millennium Coal (Stanmore and Metres), Moorvale Mine (Peabody Energy), Isaac River Project (Coking Coal One Pty. Ltd. / Bowen Coking Coal Ltd), Winchester South (Whitehaven Coal) and Olive Downs (Pembroke Resources).
- **Petroleum Tenement Holders:** Arrow Energy (CH4 Pty Ltd).

- **State Government:** Department of Environment, Tourism, Science and Innovation (DETSI), Department of Natural Resources and Mines, Manufacturing and Regional and Rural Development and Department of Primary Industries (NRMMRRD).
- **Queensland Ministerial Representatives:** Queensland Parliament - Member for Burdekin.
- **Federal Government:** Office of the Minister and Dep. Sec. Environment Protection, Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water.

6.0 PRC Plan Consultation

6.1 Pre-PRC Plan Development

DNM's construction commenced in 2011, and operations commenced in September 2013. An EIS was prepared during 2008-2009 and approved by the Coordinator-General in October 2009. An Environmental Management Plan was submitted as part of the EIS process, noting the following in Section 2.3 Mine Rehabilitation:

"The proposed post-mine land use for disturbed areas is a mosaic of self-sustaining vegetation communities and grazing land using appropriate native tree, shrub and grass species, and improved pasture species as appropriate. The criteria for achieving self-sustaining final landforms will be developed during the operation..."

Since the original EA approval, the following rehabilitation and closure-related engagement were undertaken by BMA for DNM:

- During 2018, BMA engaged with the Department of Environment and Science (DES) on the PMLUs and associated Acceptance Criteria within the EA. These PMLUs and Acceptance Criteria were included in the 18 November 2019 DNM EA amendment, reflected as Table E1 (Rehabilitation Requirements);
- Since 2021, BMA provided regular PRCP planning briefings to the IRC as part of bi-annual and special purpose meetings. This included briefing the IRC on the commencement of the DNM PRCP process (November 2022 and January 2023); and
- Since 2021, BMA also undertook ongoing consultation with the Barada Barna Aboriginal Corporation (BBAC), who represent the Barada Barna People as Traditional Owners. This included various rehabilitation-related aspects. BBAC's feedback included a request to work together with BMA to understand how they can get involved in rehabilitation execution activities over time, as guided by the PRCP Schedules to be submitted for approval.

Agreements which are in place with respect to DNM include:

- Various Compensation Agreements in place for surface rights, as well as an agistment licence for grazing;
- Stanmore hold a Compensation Agreement with WHC covering a land lease held by WHC;
- Two Access Agreements for nominated access rights is in place with one adjacent landowner to allow access to DNM and to RMI; and
- A Compensation Agreement with IRC relating to an unnamed road reserve which transects ML 1781.

6.2 Part of PRC Plan Development

BMA Consultation

Consultation undertaken by BMA as part of the initial PRC Plan preparation for DNM included letters via email to:

- IRC;
- BBAC;
- Underlying owners of land within DNM's MLs;
- Adjacent and nearby landowners who accommodate nominated access routes to DNM and RMI;
- QR, Aurizon and Ergon Energy as the owners of utilities within DNM;
- Smart Transformation Advisory Council (STAC) members representing community members, groups and businesses in Moranbah and Dysart;
- Authorised Holder Representatives of adjacent mining operations and petroleum licenses; and
- DNRMMRRD.

The following information was provided through letters to stakeholders:

- DNM location, approved activities and production;
- Requirements and timing for PRC Plan development;
- DNM Life-of-Asset (LOA);
- The plan for the mine;
- PMLUs and NUMAs; Publication of rehabilitation schedule as part of PRC Plan;
- Commitment to future engagement regarding PRCP planning for DNM; and
- Contact details for the relevant BMA team (e.g. for landholders, the Land Management team) for further information, discussion or feedback.

The results of engagement are shown in the DNM Community Consultation Register submitted as part of the PRC Plan, as outlined in Appendix 1.

WHC Consultation

Consultation undertaken by WHC in July-September 2025 included in-person meetings, letters, newsletter articles, emails, and phone calls to:

- BBAC;
- Underlying and adjacent landholders (within 5 km) of DNM's MLs;
- The General Manager and general mine personnel at DNM;
- IRC;
- Members of the Moranbah community, including residents, business owners, and community organisations and groups;
- STAC members representing community members, groups and businesses in Moranbah and Dysart; and
- Queensland Parliamentary representatives (Member for Burdekin, Hon. Dale Last MP).

The following information was provided to stakeholders:

- DNM location, approved activities and production;
- Requirements and timing for PRC Plan development, including information requirements;
- The plan for the mine (proposed site design);
- PMLUs and NUMAs, and the progressive rehabilitation schedule;
- Overview of consultation conducted to-date for the PRC Plan, and the requirement for consultation to inform the PRC Plan;
- Commitment to future engagement and participation in the process; and
- Contact details for the relevant WHC team (e.g. for landholders, the Land Management team) for further information, discussion or feedback.

The results of engagement are shown in the DNM Community Consultation Register submitted as part of the PRC Plan, as outlined in Appendix 1.

7.0 Future, Ongoing PRC Plan-Related Community Consultation

Once the DNM transitional PRC Plan has been approved, consultation as part of implementing the DNM PRC Plan will be informed by the program documented in Table 2, which includes:

- Consultation objectives;
- Stakeholders addressed by each objective;
- Engagement type; and
- Proposed frequency of consultation.

WHC will monitor progress against these objectives as part of its regular reviews of consultation commitments and outcomes.

Section 7 describes the information to be released to the community, and Section 8 describes how feedback or comments will be considered.

8.0 Information to be Released for Community Consultation

Whilst many stakeholders in the Isaac LGA and broader Mackay-Isaac-Whitsunday Region are well-educated about mining operations, there is less understanding of planning for life-of-mine, rehabilitation and closure planning. The CCP recognises the following social context:

- Talk of closure planning leads to community concerns, requiring careful and consistent messaging;
- A range of companies are engaging with local stakeholders about PRC Plans and other issues, representing considerable cumulative demands on stakeholders, and a coordinated, strategic approach will be required to manage consultation fatigue; and
- Community members are becoming increasingly aware of climate change and the impacts of resource activities and energy policies on the environment. Accordingly, community and stakeholder expectations with regards to mine rehabilitation are expected to increase over time, and need to be continuously understood.

Information to be released for community consultation, as part of future, ongoing DNM PRC planning and implementation will include:

- The rationale and scope for PRC planning;
- The approved activities, PMLUs and NUMAs for DNM;
- On-site activities and areas of disturbance;
- Proposed rehabilitation methods, schedule and milestones;
- Alignment with long-term transformation planning occurring through IRC, Regional Development Australia (RDA) and others; and
- Opportunities for community consultation as part of the PRC Plan's implementation.

Communication tools could include:

- A holding statement for general enquiries;
- Frequently asked questions and answers (FAQs) and a PRC planning fact sheet available to support consultation activities;
- Face to face and virtual meetings; and
- Updates and fact sheets about PRC planning for WHC assets.

9.0 How Feedback/Comments will be Considered

As noted in the DETSI PRCP Guidelines, in addition to the annual return requirements that relate to EAs, if a PRC Plan schedule applies to the activities then the annual return must also include an evaluation of the effectiveness of the PRC Plan schedule, including the environmental management carried out under the schedule, for the year to which the annual return relates.

WHC will internally monitor and report on the progress and outcomes of progressive rehabilitation activities against rehabilitation milestones provided in the PRC Schedule. This monitoring will aim to demonstrate a successful rehabilitation trajectory towards achievement of the approved PMLU, and/or to inform corrective action where required.

As required, PRCP Schedule progress will be reported as part of annual return submissions to DETSI.

Information about rehabilitation progress will also be delivered as part of the consultation methods detailed in Table 2, and feedback will be documented in DNM PRC Plan updates or amendments.

The PRC Plan Community Consultation Register will also be updated as community consultation activities outlined in Table 2 are completed. All stakeholder feedback recorded in the Community Consultation Register will be considered in framing and detailing future PRC Plan amendments for DNM.

This may include feedback on, for example:

- Vegetation species most suitable to the approved PMLUs;
- Rehabilitation methods to protect cultural heritage and achieve optimal use for the PMLUs;
- The PRCP (rehabilitation) schedule;
- Water management (e.g. availability for beneficial use as part of the PMLUs, or adjacent uses); and/or
- Development of business capacity programs to equip local and Indigenous businesses for rehabilitation works.

WHC has sought IRC's views on consultation options to involve Council in future PRC Plan consultation for WHC assets. WHC will utilise Council's preferred options to seek inputs on, for example, community aspirations for PMLU and social value opportunities.

10.0 PRC Plan CCP Review

Review of the DNM PRC Plan will be undertaken as legislatively required. Review and update of the CCP, incorporating community feedback to date, will be aligned to any PRC Plan updates or amendments.
